Climate Justice Candle Inspiration!

The Eco-Congregation Ireland Climate Justice Candle can be used in many different ways in a church or parish.

St Francis Xavier, Gardiner Street, Dublin hosts ECI Climate Justice Candle! - Gardiner Street Parish is located in the heart of Dublin's inner city, and only this year, made the decision to embark on the Eco-Congregation journey. As part of the Season of Creation, the parish hosted the climate justice candle during its weekend mass celebrations (September 17-18th). Wrapped in white and surrounded by flowers and green foliage, the candle was lit and processed up the church aisle. The celebrant Fr. Eco-Congregation Ireland Makes Submission to the Citizens' Assembly



Eco-Congregation Ireland joined with many other organisations and to make a submission to the

Citizens' Assembly process on *How Can the State Make Ireland a Leader in Tackling Climate Change?* GreenNews.ie reported that The Citizens' Assembly received over 1,200 submissions from the public, as well as environmental and civil society coalitions, farming groups and politicians ahead of its session on tackling climate change.

ECI offered the following recommendations to the Assembly on the State's role: targets and goals; community involvement; transport; electricity generation; farming and food production. Update on Global Webinar held by Trócaire and the Global Catholic Climate Movement



The next global ecumenical fossil fuel divestment announcement will

take place on the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, 4th October. In preparation for this, Trócaire, together with the Global Catholic Climate Movement, held a global webinar on the topic of 'prophetic voices for climate justice'. The webinar was addressed by Professor Luigino Bruni, a leading scholar in the field of civil economy, with expertise on religion and economics. Lorna Gold of Trócaire also gave an overview of a new handbook for Catholic institutions to support divestment decisions which is currently under preparation. The webinar was well attended, with over 120 registrations, 30 of which were from Ireland. The webinar and accompanying resources can be downloaded the GCCM divestment hub. "The five marks of mission"



Anglican Communion worldwide, between 1984 and 1990, agreed a five point summary of the Church's mission, known as 'The Five Marks of Mission'.

The Five Marks of Mission are: to proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom; to teach, baptise and nurture new believers; to respond to human need by loving service; to transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and to strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth. The Fifth Mark is of interest to anyone involved with Eco-Congregation Ireland, but as ecology is the study of the interconnectedness of all life and all disciplines, each Mark of Mission has a bearing on the others. In 1957 approval was given for a second Meeting for Friends who lived in Belfast, this time based in the south of the city. South Belfast



Quakers have a very strong commitment to eco issues with lots of practical recycling going on in the meeting house - recycling printer cartridges, clothing, bric a brac, spectacles, through Quaker Care charity shop, composting, low watt LED lights, etc, as well as eco issues featuring quite regularly in Meetings for Worship. Millions of straws are used every day around the world. Many of these are used for just a few minutes then are simply thrown away. In fact plastic straws are one of the top 10 items found in beach clean ups. In the ocean, plastic does not biodegrade. Instead it just breaks down into smaller pieces over hundreds of years, and it's impossible to clean up. With up to 12 million tonnes of plastic clogging up the oceans every year, it's no wonder wildlife is facing the brunt of the impacts. Lots of environmental
